### JOY AT ALL COSTS

וַיְהִי ה׳ אֶת יוֹסֵף וַיְהִי אִישׁ מַצְלִיחַ

And Hashem was with Yosef and he became a successful man.

Perhaps the most oft-repeated quote from the Rebbe – although many people don't know its source – is מצוה גדולה להיות בשמחה תמיד (Likutei Mohoran 2:24) – it is a paramount obligation to always be happy. This isn't just a "good idea" or "worthwhile advice"; the Rebbe's directive to remain happy, come what may, is absolutely crucial for survival. The moment a person allows sadness to overtake him, he is in deep trouble. The Rebbe says – and doctors agree – that every physical and emotional malady is rooted in a lack of simcha. Spiritually, too, sadness is dangerous, because the moment a person allows himself to fall into a depression, sin is not too far away. Therefore, remaining happy at all costs is of utmost importance.

This is easier said than done. When life throws yet another curve ball, how can one keep a positive frame of mind?

Let us take a lesson from Yosef Hatzaddik – for who went through more difficulties than he? He was despised by his brothers and nearly killed, yet "mercifully" sold into slavery instead. Cut off from his family and all that was familiar to him, he spent years as a servant to a non-Jew. Faced with temptation again and again yet somehow overcoming it, he was nevertheless framed with a scandalous libel which landed him in prison.

Bad enough yet? Ironically, precisely at that point in his life, the Torah says about him "נְיָהֵי אִישׁ מֵּצְלִיתִ", on which *Chazal* say (Bereishis Rabba 86:5) that he was a בֶּבֶר קֵבּוֹי, on which Chazal say (Bereishis Rabba 86:5) that he was a מַבְּר קַבּוֹי, a dancing person. Yosef was always cheerful, always energetic... in prison! How can it be? In the face of so many difficulties and the thousand reasons he had to be depressed, how was he able to keep a smile on his face and in his heart?

The answer to this lies in the words of the next passuk: "יַּיַבְא אֲדֹנָיוֹ בִּי ה׳ אָתּוֹ" – Potifar saw that Hashem was with Yosef. How so? He saw that his young servant was constantly murmuring, constantly whispering... something. When confronted, Yosef Hatzaddik explained that he was talking to Hashem and asking for success – this was how Potifar understood that Hashem was with Yosef, and this is what imbued him with joviality despite his difficulties.

Let us take a lesson from this and do whatever it takes to remain *b'simcha*, regardless of the hardships we may face. Like Yosef Hatzaddik - the איש מצליח, we will then be zoche to the actualization of the Rebbe's words "מי שהוא שמח תמיד, על ידי זה הוא מצליח".

### CHANUKAH

Think Chanukah – think light and joy. Each year anew, our neshamos are reignited by the holiness emanating from the menorah flames. Although this special time is just eight days long, we must take the light of Chanukah and carry it with us through the rest of the year.

What are the messages of Chanukah? How can we use this time to better ourselves and live happier, more productive lives?

The first thing we need to work on during these holy days is positivity. All year long, we're busy with the grind of daily life; too often, we sigh and grumble about the various difficulties we are faced with. Chanukah puts the brakes on that way of living, wakes us up and tells us, "Hello! Hashem is granting you so much good each moment!" This is what Chanukah is all about: להודות ולהלל – singing and praising Hashem. Instead of harping on our hardships, we must shift our focus to notice and appreciate the boundless good in our lives.

The few precious minutes we spend in the glow of

### A LETTER FROM THE ROSH YESHIVA

### TALK TO YOUR CHILDREN!

Dear ...

I received your letter.

The earlier you start being mechanech your children, the better. When a person is not mechanech his children while they are still young, justifying their inappropriate behavior to be "normal childish behavior," his job is much harder later on.

This is especially true in the area of kedusha. It is your responsibility to teach your children that they are not allowed to touch their אות ברית קודש. From when they are very young, you must constantly remind them, "Hashem doesn't let us touch here. You're not allowed to put your hands in this area."

If you notice your child playing inappropriately, give him a light smack on the hand and say sternly, "You are not allowed to put your hands over here!" Once they understand that this is a serious matter, they will refrain from doing so and thereby be able to grow up pure. Children who are not told about the importance of being holy have a much harder time when they are older.

Don't stop davening for erliche doros. Daven that your children should grow up pure and holy, for tefilla is the only method that really works. No chinuch methods are ever guaranteed to work; for one person, one approach may be his salvation, while for another person, the same approach only makes the situation worse. Tefilla, on the other hand, is a method that helps every person in every situation. Chazal teach us (Brachos 32a), "כל המאריך שלתו חוזרת ריקם – when a person asks Hashem for something and doesn't let up, but rather davens and davens, he will not walk away empty-handed.

This is especially true when a Yiddishe mama davens to Hashem day and night, "Hashem, grant me erliche children who will illuminate the world. Help my children be holy and never succumb to p'gam habris. Please help them remain pure." A mother who constantly davens for her children will merit children tzaddikim, who light up the world.

May Hashem bless you with success in all areas.

the flickering flames is the perfect time to pause and introspect. Think and thank! Are you

healthy? Thank Hashem! Is your family healthy? Don't stop praising Him! Have you got eyes? Ears? Teeth? Wow! How about hands? Feet? Knees, ankles, toes? Do you have clothes in your closet? A coat to wear? Shoes? How fortunate are you! And what about the countless opportunities to do mitzvos – are you an observant Jew? That alone is reason for celebration! The more a person focuses on the incredible blessings he has, the more he will realize that the good in his life far outweighs the bad.

Gratitude opens one's heart for hisbodedus. At times, although a person yearns to discuss his troubles with Hashem, he finds himself unable to articulate his thoughts. A trick to open up one's mouth is to begin by thanking Hashem. After enumerating all the good things in his life and expressing gratitude for them, he will come to the acute realization that Hashem is at his side and is with him every moment. Thus encouraged, it will be easier for the person to turn to Hashem, certain that He will help him

as He has done so in the past.

### War, Reenacted

Throughout the yom tov of Chanukah we say al hanisim a minimum of three times daily.

על הנסים... ועל הגבורות... ועל המלחמות

What exactly was this war? What were we really fighting against and what implications does that have for us today?

At the peak of the Greek empire, the Yevanim sought to obliterate our belief in hashgachas Hashem. They wanted us to think just like they did, that the world runs its own course and all that happens is purely by chance. Be it nature, happenstance or luck, they believed that Hashem was totally uninvolved in the world.

Despite their concerted efforts, the Greeks did not succeed, since the Chashmonaim were victorious in a war that very clearly defied nature. This is a message of hope to all future generations – when a person clings to Hashem, talks to Him and begs Him for help, he will never be forsaken. Yes, it may seem that based on teva there is no way out, but Hashem isn't limited to nature. He can do anything.

The war between the Greeks and the Jews was not an isolated experience; still today, we can fall into the trap of Greek ideology and forget that there is a Master Planner Who is orchestrating every last detail of our lives. When our emunah is lacking, we are at the risk of completely losing ourselves each time our plans fall through, and we feel helpless and hopeless in the face of the laws of nature. However, we must take the lesson of Chanukah and re-

few... despite all "nature," "happenstance" or "luck."

Chanukah reminds us that Hashem is the only One running this world. A person who accustoms himself to speaking to Him constantly, thanking Him for the past and turning to Him for the future, will always be happy and serene.

May we use the *yom tov* of Chanukah to readjust our focus, enriching our lives and the lives of those around us.

## WITH TWO OLDER SINGLE BROTHERS, WHEN WILL <u>I</u> GET MARRIED?



### **QUESTION:**

To the Rosh Yeshiva shlita,

I am twenty two years old and have two older brothers who are still single. I am yearning to get married and desperate to move on in life, but it seems like my turn will never come.

I can't speak to my father, because he wants my brothers to get married before even thinking of me entering shidduchim.

Is there anything I can do? Thank you.

### THE ROSH YESHIVA'S RESPONSE:

Dear ...,

What will you gain by speaking to your father? How can he help you? He is even more stressed than you are; he is waiting anxiously for there to be *simchos* in your family.

Your *shidduch* is not in your father's hands, and neither are those of your brothers. *Shidduchim* are only in the hands of Hashem. *Chazal* teach us (Bereishis Rabba 68:3) that we see this in *Torah*, *Nevi'im* and *Kesuvim*:

In Torah, the passuk says (Bereishis 24:50), "ויען לבן ובתואל" – Lavan and Besuel saw that they could not hold Rivka back from marrying Yitzchak because 'The matter stemmed from Hashem!'

In *Nevi'im*, the *passuk* says (*Shoftim 14:4*), "ואביו ואמו לא ידעו" – Shimshon Hagibor's parents didn't know that the *shidduch* he found was from Hashem.

In *Kesuvim,* the *passuk* says *(Mishlei 19:14), "חלת" – A* house and wealth are an inheritance from fathers, but a *shidduch* comes only from Hashem.

The following is a *tefilla* Mohorosh wrote for *bachurim* to say every day. Say it each day and you will be *zoche* to find your *shidduch* quickly.

"Ribono Shel Olam, help me find a good shidduch already. Help me get married quickly and easily and not have to wait so long anymore.

"Hashem, I know there were times when I didn't conduct myself properly, and I wasn't always as *erlich* as I should have been. However, I beg of You, don't withhold my *shidduch* for this reason. Forgive me for everything that I have transgressed and help me get married already, so that I should be protected from the *yetzer hara* and be able to be *erlich* already.

"What should I do, Hashem? If it would be up to me, I would be willing to get married tonight! What can I do if I wasn't yet zoche to find my shidduch? I'm waiting and waiting and I've been davening for this for so long, but my yeshua did not come yet.

"Chazal teach us that when one gets married after the age of twenty, he will think of aveiros his entire life. Additionally, You say that such a person's bones shall disintegrate. Why do I deserve such a harsh punishment? Am I at fault? Isn't it enough that I suffer pain and anguish for being alone and not yet married?

"Hashem, please help me endure this difficult time and help me have patience until my yeshua arrives. Help me
