The more obstacles we endure by coming to the Tzadik, the more holiness and purity we receive. The Rebbe said in (Lekutei Moharan 1:185), Those who have a hard time coming to the Tzadik, his father disagrees with him, his own wife disapproves, his father in law bugs him, or struggles from other people who don't let him serve Hashem, is only difficulties he has until he comes to the Tzadik. Stooped So Low

The Rosh Yeshiva Says:

Forty years. Thousands of days. Millions of minutes made up the time that Klal Yisrael spent in the midbar, when they experienced countless nissim each moment, lived under the shelter of the shechina, and even heard the Voice of Hashem at Har Sinai. Yet despite their elevated level, in this week's Parsha we see that they

nonetheless traded their belief in Hashem for belief in the gods of Moav, lifeless idols of wood and stone. How is this possible? How could they, a holy and exalted nation, have stooped so low? There is only one way to drag a Jew away from Hashem: by enticing him to sin with immorality. Immorality muddles the mind and causes one to lose his Emunah; therefore, sinning with the Bnos Moav was the cause for Klal Yisrael's subsequent sin of Avoda Zara.

Make This Time Sweet

The Rosh Yeshiva Says:

Chazal tell us (Maasros 1:4) that almonds have a bitter taste as they grow but turn sweet once they ripen. The days of bein hametzarim (which are compared to almonds) & seem to be bitter, but we can make this time sweet by using its opportunities properly. On the same note, each person has times when life seems to be bitter and shrouded in darkness. The Zohar teaches (Hakdamas Bereishis 4a) that our life's mission is to take these bitter, dark times and transform them into sweetness and light. The only way to

do so is by remembering the One Who is standing behind the hardships. Hashem provides us all with unique struggles in order to draw us close to Him.

A person who curses when something doesn't go his way demonstrates how distant he is from Hashem. The Rebbe teaches (Sefer Hamiddos, Os Klalah), "One who is accustomed to cursing is from Olam HaTohu," meaning that he lives without emunah and his life is vacant and meaningless. The Rebbe also states the opposite, "One who is accustomed to blessing others is from Olam HaTikkun." This person knows that no one can harm him if it is not Hashem's will, and no one can take anything that is rightfully his. His life is complete; his life is blessed.

I beg you again leave your beard and Peyos alone and you will merit to have everything good. By having a beard and Peyos, is having an image of Hashem.
