CHIZUK from the PARSHA

WEALTH TO SHARE

וכי ימוך אחיך ומטה ידו עמך והחזקת בו... וחי עמך

And if your brother is impoverished and cannot sustain himself, you shall strengthen him... and he should live together with you.

A *meshulach* trudges through an upscale neighborhood, past beautifully constructed houses on multi-acre properties, perfectly manicured lawns with magnificent landscaping, late-model cars in wide and expansive driveways...

He rings one bell after another, hoping for generous donations. When he is lucky, he walks away with a well-padded pocket; when he is less fortunate, all he gets is an apologetic, "I'd love to help, but I'm having a hard time now and I can't give... I'm sorry."

A quick glance around the wealthy man's luxurious home gives rise to the obvious question: is it really true that he is "struggling"? Or is he perhaps just looking for an excuse to keep all his money for himself? R' Nosson explains this paradox as follows (Likutei Halachos Kiddushin 3:4):

The rich man really **does** has enough to give - just look how much he is able to spend on himself. "Finances are tight," he says, but that's only according to his own standards. He allows himself to live opulently, but the poor man who comes to ask for assistance... that's another story.

מי שיש לו מנה רוצה מאתים is a universal rule, applicable to every person in every economic bracket. The desire for more never ends, because it's never enough. As soon as a person starts doing well financially, his standards of living change. If he has some money to spare, why not have a nicer house, designer clothes, a pricier car? The problem is



that he doesn't really have enough money to support such an extravagant lifestyle, so he inevitably needs more money, which raises his standards more, which necessitates a bigger income... and so the cycle continues.

For the well-to-do fellow, there's always room for improvement in lifestyle. Yet when asked to give *tzedaka*, he starts to do some serious budgeting. Why is he asking for so much? Who does he think he is, anyway? (As if the wealthy are entitled to whatever they want, but the poor? They're not deserving of anything more than bread and water.)

A wise person realizes that **wealth comes only from Hashem**. We all need the kindness of Hashem in order to be successful, which we can only merit with the *mitzvah* of *tzedaka*. It may be difficult to part with hard-earned money, but in truth, giving is what gives us with more. The more generous we are with others, the more generous Hashem will be with us.

This is the lesson we learn from this week's *parsha*. יחי אחיך עמך - Your brother should live **with you**. Just like you allow yourself to live a little more luxuriously, allow your brother - the poor man - to do so, too. See that he should be comfortable financially; do whatever you can to make him happy. In return, Hashem will repay you generously and you will lack for nothing.

HAPPILY MARRIED

Dear ...

I received your letter.

Dedicate time each day to learn the *sefer* called *Otzar Shalom Bayis* and the *kuntreisim* in English, "To Love and to Cherish," "Happily Married," and "Together Forever," in which Mohorosh gives guidance on how to establish a beautiful and meaningful marriage. He teaches us the how to live peacefully at home, and how important it is for a person to help his wife and judge her favorably.

Suffering is the result of aveiros. The Baal Shem Tov says, "When one sins with thoughts of immorality, his children will give him much grief; when he sins with immoral speech, his wife will bring him anguish; when he does aveiros in action, those around him will cause him pain." Instead of throwing the blame onto your wife, do teshuva for all that you have transgressed.

If you will repent completely, you will be zoche to what Shlomo Hamelech teaches (Mishlei 16:7), "He who follows in Hashem's ways will see his enemies make peace with him." Chazal say (Bereishis Rabbah 54:1) that this is referring to one's wife. When a person conducts himself the way he should, his wife will assist him and respect him, and they will live in harmony.

Look at the way *tzaddikim* acted with their wives (Yevamos 63): R' Chiya had a wife with a difficult nature who caused him much suffering. Still, whenever R' Chiya saw something his wife would enjoy, he brought it home for her to make her happy. Once, Rav asked R' Chiya, "I don't understand; why do you make the effort despite all that she does to you?"

R' Chiya replied, "It is enough for me that she protects me from sin and raises the children." This is a lesson for every man to respect his wife and try to make her happy, no matter what.

May Hashem bless you with success in all your endeavors.

There's nothing like Meron on Lag Ba'omer. The air is loaded with enormous potential just waiting to be tapped into... and the area is packed with enormous crowds. If you'll look around, you will notice a fascinating sight. See the diversity? White shirt, gold kaftan and florescent orange t-shirt blend as the people stand hand in hand, dancing with fervor and joy. Chassidish, litvish, ashkenazi, sefardi... everyone finds their place at Reb Shimon Bar Yochai's kever.

The *sefer Bais Aharon* explains this as follows: "Just as Hashem is for all of Klal Yisroel, so too is Reb Shimon Bar Yochai for all of *Klal Yisroel*-even the lowliest amongst them." *Tzaddikim* speak the one language we all have in common: that of the *neshama*. That is why every Yid feels a connection to Reb Shimon.

In Your Own Corner

Jamming, squeezing and elbowing through thousands of people is part and parcel of the Meron experience. As thrilling as it is to brag to family and friends that "I made into the *me'arah*," it isn't really necessary to forcibly push



your way in there. The *kedusha* of Reb Shimon is not limited to the actual *me'arah*; the entire mountain and surrounding areas of Meron are saturated with holiness.

Whether you find yourself with hundreds of people ahead of you in line or you simply don't have stamina to walk up the mountain, remember that the actual location is insignificant. Connect to Reb Shimon from wherever you are. Find a quiet corner where you can actually hear your own thoughts and daven to Hashem in your own words. Ask for your *tefillos* to be answered in the *zechus* of all the *tzaddikim* buried there, and you will surely receive the *yeshuos* you were davening for.


To Merit Children

The *Midrash* tells a story of a childless couple that came to Reb Shimon bar Yochai for advice. "We are married for ten years," they told him. "Is it time for divorce? Maybe we should each remarry and perhaps bear children from another marriage."

Reb Shimon agreed to arrange the *get*, on condition that their divorce be celebrated as a joyous event. "Just like you celebrated your marriage with a *seuda*, celebrate your divorce with a *seuda*, too."

The couple prepared a festive meal in their home and invited many guest to join, in gratitude to Hashem for the connection, love and understanding they had shared. After drinking a bit too much wine, the husband stood up before the crowd and addressed his wife. "You have been so good to me

you think into it, you will realize that hitting is not *chinuch*; it is only the

result of a parent's or teacher's anger and frustration. It is therefore forbidden to slap or beat children - not only does it not help, but it actually makes the situation worse.

(If you will have to use this approach and confront the *rebbi* with this warning, be very careful that your child does not find out about it. Parents must give over a sense of respect toward their children's *melamdim*. It must be done in private so that your son retains his respect for his *rebbi*.)

Daven that your children should grow up to be *erliche* Yidden. Parents must cry and plead by Hashem to see *nachas*. The Chasam Sofer *zt"I* was once asked how he merited such righteous children, to which he replied, "Every night while I said *tikkun chatzos*, I filled an entire cup with tears for good children." Through *tefilla* you can be *zoche* to righteous generations.

Q&A

MY SON'S REBBI DOESN'T STOP HITTING

Question:

To the Rosh Yeshiva shlita,

My son just entered sixth grade and is miserable in *cheder*. His *rebbi*'s method for establishing discipline in the classroom is to hit the boys every single day for the slightest infractions. In his mind, the "disobedience" of a child who doesn't follow along with his finger in the *sefer* warrants a violent slap. My son

comes home in tears each day.

I've spoken to the principal numerous times but he refuses to acknowledge the problem. He insists that there's nothing wrong with giving a child a *potch* and that's how they grow up *erlich*. He claims that his own grandchildren learned in this *rebbi*'s class and they turned out wonderful.

What else can I do? I cannot watch the *rebbi* destroy my son.

The Rosh Yeshiva's Response:

Dear...,

Meet with your son's melamed and speak to him. Start the discussion by saying how happy you are that he is your son's *rebbi* and that your son is learning a lot in his

class. Only afterwards should you tell him that your son often comes home in tears and is scared to go to *cheder*; ask him to please stop hitting your child.

If your son continues to come home from *cheder* crying, go over to the *rebbi*, grab him by the collar and give him a clear and stern warning, "If you won't stop hitting my child, I will break your bones!"

There is no excuse whatsoever to hit chil-

dren. Mohorosh used to say that a *rebbi* who uses physical force should go work for the sanitation department. He should spare the poor children his fury and instead

use his brute strength to swing garbage cans and throw trash into the truck.

There are countless children who abandon Yiddishkeit later on because they were beaten and shamed for trivialities. Even though the principal's grandchildren happened to turn out okay after going through such *gehinnom*, it doesn't mean that every child will survive it. אין סומכין - Don't rely on miracles (Pesachim 64b).

The Rebbe taught us never to hit children. If
